# Building a rural and remote health workforce with place-based education

month we supported the University of Tasmania to apply for more rural medical student places so we can train local students closer to home. There are many barriers to studying medicine and training outside cities outlined in this month's MJA and delivering place-based education would enable more rural students to study locally and follow their postgraduate rural pathway.

Stronger rural placements are a key element in our long-term rural recruitment. Later this month we will be able to offer grants for infrastructure for practices to expand training, we look forward to working closely with you in delivering more training places in General Practice.

## **Rural Clinical School Year 2 Rural Week**

The University of Tasmania Rural Clinical School and Launceston Clinical School were excited to host Year 2 rural week in the North and North West of the state. Students from Hobart Year 2 spent two days learning rural clinical

skills in Launceston and Burnie. Students got a chance to find out all the benefits of living and studying rurally. The students also got to visit the Australian Maritime College to learn essential water survival skills and first aid in a marine environment. RG Dr Chris Holden, who is based on the east coast gave an inspirational talk about his work across Australia and the world, putting these rural skills into practice. We look forward to welcoming these students back for their clinical years.



# 'Better than Awesome' - New Consulting Skills Workshop for International Doctors

In early August we ran a whole day workshop for international graduates covering consulting skills and written communication. We had 14 participants who had trained in 12 different countries and now working on the NW coast. Consulting skills remain one of the barriers for international doctors to getting their AMC exams and onto GP training schemes. This workshop looked specifically at how Australian graduates are taught and assessed on communication skills and ran small group OSCE's and feedback sessions so the doctors could practice these skills. One of the participants, who has been here two years, said the course was 'better than awesome', explaining they learned many things that will help them succeed in the Australian setting.

# Point-of-Care Ultrasound Workshop

We had an amazing point-of-care ultrasound (POCUS) workshop in Burnie in early August. The course was facilitated by Dr Louisa Lee, who has recently joined the THS NW emergency department team as a consultant with special interest in POCUS.

27 participants learnt core ultrasound skills including:

- eFast
- deep venous thrombosis
- heart and lung ultrasound
- intravenous line placement and foreign object retrieval
- musculoskeletal soft tissue
- first trimester transabdominal obstetric ultrasound.

We look forward to hearing from participants on how they put their skills to use.

Thanks to RACGP Rural for organising this important workshop and all the facilitators and student volunteers that made this such a good session.

Congratulation to Dr Cyril Latt, Dr Jane Cooper and Dr David Knowles for recognition of their work in Palliative Care.


Cyril Latt was the winner of the Outstanding Palliative Care

## **Remote Supervision Now Possible with Both Colleges**

Using the experience of high-quality training providers such as Remote Vocational Training Scheme, the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) and Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine (ACRRM) have developed guidelines and models of remote supervision that will suit many communities. This will allow more communities to have registrars, even where there are no supervisors. We look forward to working with more remote registrars and supporting this important initiative. # Launceston General Hospital EMET Training hub

Staff across Hospitals North Primary Health sites will soon receive specialist emergency medical training. The LGH has been awarded status as an Emergency Medicine and Training (EMET) hub, an initiative funded by a Commonwealth grant to the Australasian College for Emergency Medicine. An exciting High Acuity Low Occurrence (HALO) workshop is already planned at the beautiful White Sands Estate.



## **New Free Service for GPs**

What is the service? The GP Psychiatry Support Line gives GPs direct access to qualified psychiatrists for advice regarding the mental health of their patients. GPs can call 1800 161 718 between 7am and 7pm Monday to Friday (excluding public holidays). The psychiatrists can offer advice on a wide range of topics including medication diagnosis treatment options safety planning referral pathways psychosocial matters. It is not about triaging or referring consumers to a psychiatrist; it's about keeping patients whose conditions can be treated within



primary care under the care of their GP. It is not for crisis situations. The psychiatrists will not diagnose patients or offer a second opinion on a diagnosis; rather they will support GPs with the information and advice they need to assess and care for their patients.

#### Who is it for?

This service is for GPs seeking advice about their patients (all ages). It is not for the patients to use themselves and cannot be used by other care providers.

#### Who delivers it?

The Australian Government Department of Health and Aged Care has engaged ProCare Mental Health Services to deliver the service. ProCare, a not-for-profit organisation, has been operating the phone line in parts of Australia since 2018, and the service went national on I July this year.

#### How much does it cost?

This service is free for GPs to use, thanks to Australian Government funding. How can GPs access the service? GPs first need to register by calling 1800 161 718 or going online to gpsupport.org.au (AHPRA registration and practice details needed; allow 24 hours for online registration to take effect). After registering, GPs can call 1800 161 718 between 7am and 7pm Monday to Friday (excluding public holidays) or book a session online. After an inquiry, the GP will receive a digital report within one business day. More information is available on the <u>GP Psychiatry Support Line website</u>.

# **Rural Health Funding Inequity**

The "Evidence base for additional investment in rural health in Australia" report released in June by the National Rural Health Alliance shows Australia's governments spend \$848 less per person per year on people living outside major cities. At the same time, people in rural and remote areas including people in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities on average have lower socioeconomic status, record poorer health outcomes, and face greater practical obstacles to accessing services due to remoteness.
