


# Single Employer Model pilot announced

The Single Employer Model is a State and Federal government initiative aimed at supporting general practice in Tasmania.

The initiative provides support for GP trainees by ensuring they have a clear training pathway and equal entitlements to trainees in other training programs. There are 20 places available in General Practice for the GP trainees, with additional places available for the hospital training component. This program aims to give GP trainees the security and stability they need to succeed in their careers.

Consultation and working groups are being set up to determine the best way of delivering this. We will be running a series of information gathering and sharing sessions to get this started. Please join us to make this a successful program in Tasmania.

# **New CPD arrangements**

New CPD arrangements have started in 2023. The new Medical Board of Australia requirements oblige you to log 50 hours of CPD and complete a professional development plan every year and refresh your skills with one CPR course in the triennium.

The focus is on regular performance feedback, collaboration with peers, self-reflection and reviewing patient outcomes – things that you're already doing as a rural GP, like group meetings, teaching and case reviews or hospital or nursing home rounds. # Wanted: practices to grow their own John Flynn Rural Doctor

The John Flynn Prevocational Doctor Program starts in 2023. This will replace the current Rural Junior Doctor Training Innovation Fund and will give us more opportunities (and funding) to place junior doctors in General Practice.

The Program will place interns and Resident Medical Officers in GP practices for a 12-week term as part of their hospital-based rotations. The Scottsdale practice, who have been training junior doctors in for many years, have watched these junior doctors come back as registrars and then rural GP's and RG's.
