Nurse Immuniser Authorisation

Practicum Guide & Skills Assessment Record

Introduction

A Registered Nurse or midwife must meet clinical practice requirements in order to become an Authorised Nurse Immuniser (NI) in Tasmania, Regulation 82(1)(d) of the Poisons Regulations 2018. The information contained within this guide is designed as a resource. This document is directed at RN's or midwives who have completed an Immunisation for Registered Nurses course which does not contain a practical component. It provides a record of the clinical immunisation practicum and must be completed in consultation with preceptors. This clinical record must be included with the *Initial Nurse Immuniser Authorisation Application* documents.

Requirements

A Registered Nurse / midwife is required to undertake clinical practice in order to become an Authorised Immuniser (AI) in Tasmania. During this clinical practice the nurse is required to administer ten different client vaccination encounters under the supervision of a preceptor. At least five different vaccines must be administered to children aged two years of age or younger, including no more than one oral vaccine.

There must be no actual or perceived conflict of interest between the trainee and the preceptor.

Preceptor Role/Guide

A preceptor may be either:

- An experienced Nurse Immuniser who is authorised to practice in Tasmania, in accordance with Regulation 82(1)(d) of the Poisons Regulations 2018. The AI must have a minimum of 2 years recent clinical experience administering vaccines, under the National Immunisation Program, to all age groups (infants, children and adults) and be working under a Department of Health (DoH) Program Approval.
- A General Practitioner/Medical Officer who has a minimum of two years recent and regular experience administering vaccines, under the National Immunisation Program, to all age groups (infants, children and adults).

Preceptors are required to assess the nurse's clinical performance according to recommendations in the current edition of <u>The Australian Immunisation Handbook</u> and comply with the <u>Funded Immunisation Schedule Tasmania</u> and the <u>Free vaccines supplied in Tasmania</u> and their indication for use.

The assessment and judgement of competence in the clinical practice setting should include multiple methods such as clinical observation, questioning and review of documentation to measure accuracy, autonomy, knowledge and attitudes.

A Preceptor is required to observe and assess the nurse, provide appropriate feedback and complete the Skills Assessment Record (Attachment 1). The preceptor is required to indicate if the nurse demonstrates overall competence in the provision of vaccinations according to the performance criteria in the essential immunisation practice standards, or whether the nurse requires additional practice to further develop their clinical knowledge and skills.

The key areas include:

- Availability of an in-date Anaphylaxis Response Kit before each immunisation session
- Knowledge of and maintenance of cold chain requirements during the immunisation sessions
- Completion of the pre-vaccination assessment and ensuring valid consent
- Selection of the appropriate vaccine(s)
- Following standard occupational health and safety guidelines for hygiene to minimise the risk of needle stick injury
- Correct administration of the vaccine(s)
- Providing immediate after care
- Knowledge of common adverse events following immunisation (AEFI) and their management, and the process for documenting and reporting an AEFI in Tasmania
- Documentation, including reporting of vaccinations to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).

Registered Nurse / Midwife Responsibilities

It is expected that the Nurse will:

- Be familiar with the current National Immunisation Program (NIP) schedule.
- Comply with the <u>Funded Immunisation Schedule in Tasmania</u>, and <u>Free vaccines</u> supplied in Tasmania and their indication for use.
- Adhere to standard vaccination procedures as outlined in the <u>Australian Immunisation</u> Handbook.
- Use principles of adult learning and demonstrate motivation to seek out and avail themselves of learning opportunities as they occur in the practice setting
- Demonstrate 'safe practice' by seeking advice from the Preceptor when required.
- The Crown carries no liability in respect of nurses carrying out vaccinations; it is the nurses' obligation and responsibility to ensure they have their own appropriate professional, public and other indemnity coverage.

Please forward the completed *Skills Assessment Record* (Attachment 1) with your Initial Immunisation Authorisation Application to the Communicable Diseases Prevention Unit (CDPU).
